Mark Chester Presents Shanghai In Black and White Sunday, September 11, 2016, 1:30 P.M. Woman's Club Workshop, 72 Columbus St., Newton Highlands MA



In 1987, Mark Chester created and produced the traveling exhibition and catalog *Shanghai: In Black and White* as part of a cultural exchange program in commemoration of San Francisco's Sister City. He spent

six weeks in Shanghai with assistant, friend, and translator "Bill" Cheng photographing the life and pulse of this emerging, modern city. The photographs were displayed at the Fort Lauderdale FL Museum of Art; The Sidwell Friends School, Washington, DC; and the San Francisco Main Library.

At the September 11th PHSNE meeting, Mark will present a slide show of photographs from the Shanghai portfolio. He will discuss how to organize writing an article based on this photo essay/documentary, and how he produced a traveling exhibition and accompanying catalog.

Chester has been a professional photographer since 1972. He was Director of Photography and staff photographer at ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers). His photographs are in the permanent collections of Baltimore, Brooklyn,




Corcoran, Denver, Portland (Maine), and San Francisco museums, among others. Chester is a Copley Artist member of the Copley Society of Art in Boston.

Chester's publications include *Twosomes*, featuring over 200 plates and 100 image pairs representing forty years of photography, and *No in America*, a signed limited edition hardcover



book of 500 copies, also published as a softcover book, documenting the word as it occurs on public notices. His photographs accompanied Charles





Contributing to an ethnic diversity project, Chester photographed naturalized citizens from nearly 170 countries who now reside in Massachusetts for the 2016 publication of *The Bay State: A Multicultural Landscape*.

Chester explains that "Photography is the medium that best expresses

my observations and travel experiences. My work is not limited to any specific category. They are pictures of people, places and things that have touched me in some emotional, intellectual and whimsical way.

Researcher QT Luong visited and photographed every national park in all 50 states, the first to accomplish this using a large-format camera. He has over 12,000 photographs of which 59, one from each park, are on display at the Museum of Science in Boston through September 18th.

Introducing Holly Worthington Director of School Outreach



PHSNE member Holly Worthington has volunteered to be the Director of School Outreach. Holly, who teaches art and darkroom photography at the Walnut Hill School of the Arts in Natick, will manage the selection and placement of 35mm SLR cameras with photography programs in both public and privates

schools throughout New England. Originally from Ohio, she received her B.F.A. and M.A.T. from Maryland Institute College of Art.

Thanks to an Art Renewal for Teachers grant, Holly traveled to Labrador, Canada, to work on a project that uses images of landscapes as metaphors for medical specialties. An additional grant allowed Holly to develop and integrate a student self-portrait project into a core segment of Walnut Hill School's biology curriculum.

As a fine art photographer, Holly's work has been shown and privately collected in both the United States and Canada. Venues for her exhibitions include solo, juried, and group shows at galleries, photography centers, and hospitals. She has been a featured artist in both the Boston Arts Festival, sponsored by Mayor Thomas Menino and the city's Office of Tourism, and the Cambridge Science Festival, organized by the MIT Museum in Cambridge.

Holly's recent and continuing projects include the Medical Specialties Landscape Photography Project; Cityscapes of the Boston Longwood Medical Area; and Cabbages and Kings, Portraits and Landscapes of Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, and Labrador. She has a summer studio in Nova Scotia where, alongside medium and large format work, she explores processes as diverse as wet plate collodion and image capture with an Ipod Touch.

Holly is married to the artist James Woodside and they have two daughters currently working and living in the Boston area.

Good Things Come in Small Packages

Miniature Cameras are a HIT

They look like toys, but all cameras shown are functioning miniature cameras. From the 1930s through the 1950s, a number of companies produced cameras that use paper-backed 16mm or 17.5 film. Examples are the Colly, Bell 14, Sing-88, Mykro-Fine, Mycro, and Hit cameras, all manufactured in Japan, most after WW II. The cameras were produced in a variety of colors.

McKeown's Price Guide to Antique and Classic Cameras (2001) lists 95 miniatures and claims many more models exist. All are described as Hit-type

cameras. Most sell in the \$25 to \$40 range, but a few are going for several hundred dollars.

The quality of the images produced by these miniatures is sufficient to make a 6 x 6 print. The cameras make a

good addition to a collection, requiring minimal display space; a single small wall shelf can accommodate an impressive array. The photo shows four such cameras and film rolls; the silver dollar gives a size comparison.

Miniature Studio is Amazing! An Historically Accurate 19th Century Photo Studio Built in 1:12 Scale



Turkeybased (Iraqi -born) artist Ali Alamedy had been building miniature sets for seven years

when he came across documentation of Charles Miner's photography studio from the early 1900s.

Inspired by the way sunlight was used to illuminate studio sets, Alamedy decided to build his own version in 1:12 scale. The project took him over nine months, using hundreds of feet of wood, and building more than 100 minia-



ture objects designed specifically to fit the era.

Due to few images being available of photography studios at that time, Alamedy read extensively to figure out what tools, techniques, styles, and colors



were used within the studios (all images were in black and white). One of the hardest challenges during the completion of the model was the camera, as each fold in the bellow in real life is just 3

cm. The final 1:12 scale camera has 124 2 mm folds that were all meticulously created by hand.

In Memoriam:

Remembering Edward J. Richardson, Jr.



With sadness, we report the passing of long-time PHSNE member Edward T. Richardson, Jr. who died in South Portland ME on April 18th at the age of ninety-four. As noted in his obituary, "One of Richardson's passions was photography, and he was active in the Portland Camera Club serving at various times as president, treasurer and a

trustee. He specialized in black-and-white photography and he did his own developing and printing. He won the club's first prize in the black-and-white category consistently, and the club ultimately gave him a lifetime achievement award. He taught and lectured in nature photography from time to time and his photographs have appeared in numerous publications devoted to the natural environment In 1983, Richardson received the Sol Feinstone Environmental Award for outstanding contributions to conservation and the natural environment."
